In this conte, t, we welcome the readiness to cooperation between the E2 and the relevant countries in the region, as well as international organisations, first of all the ! frican 2nion, and the wider international community, including the 2# Security 3ouncil, and call upon all sta%eholders to increase their wor% to address the root causes of such a humanitarian disaster, as well as tac%ling traffic%ing and smuggling in the Mediterranean. 1 e also welcome active involvement of the 2# High 3ommissioner for Human 4ights and the 2# High 3ommissioner for 4efugees to address effectively the deep real causes of irregular migration5 poverty, conflicts, crisis, and human rights violations. 1 e welcome the prospects of close cooperation in this regard between all sta%eholders in the Mediterranean region.

/he problem of displacement is well+%nown to "eorgia as a country of both origin and destination of migration. "eorgia is a host country for more than)*'' refugees and asylum see%ers. Since the)77's, we have been facing a severe problem of .D8s and refugees originating from the two regions of "eorgia, with the new wave of displacement following the (''9 "eorgia+4ussia war.: verall, as a result of the full+scale 4ussian invasion and illegal military occupation of the "eorgian regions of !b%ha; ia and /s%hinvali and the subse<uent ethnic cleansing, nearly half a million persons have been displaced. /heir homes were, for the most part, destroyed or sold off, their families and communities torn apart.

/o our regret, twenty+one years after the adoption of the .38D 8rogramme of ! ction, the international community has made limited progress in preventing forced displacement and in identifying durable solutions. ! ccording to the latest available data, the number of refugees and .D8s has reached the highest levels since the Second 1 orld 1 ar, few forcibly displaced persons are able to return to their home communities, millions of refugees remain caught in situations of protracted displacement. /hus, the ob=ectives and actions in regard to refugees, asylum+see%ers and displaced persons, as they were listed in 3hapter > the)77? .38D 8rogramme of ! ction, remain as relevant today as they were () years ago.

/he MD"s also focused on education, health and hunger but, unfortunately, they failed to protect the human rights of migrants and enhance the positive effects of this enabler for global sustainable development.
