

TOWARDS A GLOBAL COMPACT FOR SAFE, ORDERLY AND REGULAR MIGRATION

- 1.2 This Global Compact would set out a range of principles and understandings among UN Member States regarding international migration in all its dimensions. It would make an important contribution to global governance on international migration. It would present a framework for comprehensive international cooperation on migrants and human mobility. It would deal with the human rights,

- Combat migrant smuggling
- Combatting human trafficking and migrant smuggling.
- Promotion of the inclusion of migrants in host societies and regularization of migrants.
- The facilitation of safe, orderly and regular migration; the creation and expansion of safe, regular pathways for migration (moved)
- Protection of labour rights and promotion of safe and secure working environment for migrant workers, including those in precarious employments.
- Protection of women migrant workers in all sectors, including those involved in domestic work.
- Promotion of labour mobility and family reunification and educational programmes for expanding pathways for admissions.
- Temporary protection and migration on humanitarian grounds.
- A framework for greater international cooperation to improve migration governance.
- Promotion of cheaper, faster and safer means of transfer of remittances in both source and recipient countries, including the reduction of transaction cost of migrant remittances and charges associated with remittance corridors
- Financial services for migrants and their families in both home and host countries, including through the use of new technologies.
- Enhanced cooperation on access to and portability of earned benefits, enhance the recognition of foreign qualification, education and skills.
- Interaction between diasporas and their countries of origin.
- Access to basic services relating in particular to health, education and support for livelihood opportunities for both refugees and members of host communities migrants
- Disaggregated data on international migration in order to develop evidence-based policies.
