- 4. Singapore will study closely the draft articles produced thus far. However, my delegation would like to make three initial observations. First, on Article 1 on the Scope of the present draft articles, my delegation agrees that immunity from foreign criminal jurisdiction is procedural in nature and serves only as a procedural bar to criminal proceedings. The underlying substantive criminal responsibility remains. As such, immunity from foreign criminal jurisdiction should not be viewed as a loophole in the fight against impunity.
