terrorists, and at least 26 partners share financial information that could provide actionable leads to interdict or prosecute FTFs. At least 31 countries use enhanced traveler screening measures today. Furthermore, approximately 60 countries have laws in place to provide the ability to prosecute and penalize FTF activities and at least 65 countries have prosecuted or arrested FTFs or FTF facilitators. We can all stand to learn from each other on these gains, but there is much more work that can be done to fully implement resolution 2178. Moreover, the international

community should focus on what the evolving terrorist threat will look like as FTFs seek to

To do our part, we are pleased to note that we continue to make voluntary contributions to the UNODC Terrorism Prevention Branch, UNDP, INTERPOL, and UNICRI for development of research, assistance and training.
