Madame Chair,

If there is one certainty that has emerged from the uncertain times we have been navigating, it's this: the rule of law is not an idea we debate and refine when all is going well; it is rather the very thing that protects people when all is not.

Be it at the national or international level, equality before the law, accountability, independent and unhindered justice, respect for human rights are part and parcel of a strong rules based system.

From the 2019 protest movements in Lebanon, to the calls for truth and justice in the aftermath of the Beirut port blast, promoting a 'requires meeting the legitimate aspirations of the Lebanese people for a country free of corruption and where social justice becomes a daily reality, down to the most basic exercise of social or public action.

Women and youth as agents of change have been a solid driving force in carrying those ideas. NGOs and civil society organizations, work to reinforce every day, in each and every part of the country, the rule of law: from providing legal aid to the most vulnerable, to fighting corruption, to ensuring access to justice.

The United Nations has also been a longstanding partner of my country and has provided support in various areas. The Secretary-General's annual report on strengthening and coordinating United Nations rule of law activities contains information on some activities carried out by the United Natntmheta 1.43 (Minieatru 5M(a) (r) 1.2 (d)

Madame Chair,

Respect for the UN Charter remains central in reinforcing a multilateral framework based on international legality.

In the same vein, implementation of relevant international legal instruments, of United Nations resolutions, - particularly Security Council resolutions - are at the core of the promotion of the rule of law.

International and hybrid Tribunal and Courts continue to fulfill an indispensable role in pursuing the rule of law. The International Court of Justice remains one of the main organs for the peaceful settlement of disputes between States. Abiding by its judgements and advisory opinions can only reinforce the multilateral-rules based order.

The Special Tribunal for Lebanon established to prosecute victims of the 2005
