Specifically, the Global Forum recommended that migrand migration-nelated issues should be integrated in the post-2015 development agenda i following ways: (1) in the declaration of the post-2015 development agenda; (2) as a mean implement the new development goals; (3) within the context of poverty eradication, educated the health, decent work, and equality, and (4) through disaggregated reporting of the development outcomes by migratory status.

While the global community has thus made important strides in recognizing the contribution international migration for human and sustainable development, limited recognition of transformative nature of migration and its contribution to development has been given in intergovernmental negotiations on the means of implementation and the financing development.

This side-event will explore how migration, including expanded avenues for regular la mobility, reduction in related costs, portability of earned social security benefits and recogn of skills, can generate substantial additional resources for development and boost dispoint incomes.
