The 6ffice of the +ecretary&! eneral's \$nvoy on ; outh has worked alongside , - partners to organi3e the ?orum. This is going to bring together young people from around the world to discuss their ideas, concerns and actions, specifically around the +ustainable evelopment! oals, and discuss these with government representatives, policymakers, , - officials and other stakeholders.

In the coming months, the epartment will continue to support the +ecretary&! enerals efforts to implement the ! eneral #ssemblys resolution on the establishment of the , - ; outh 6ffice, which will integrate the activities of the 6ffice of the \$nvoy on ; outh. This will be an important step forward in strengthening the partnership between the , - and young people and ensuring meaningful youth engagement in intergovernmental policymaking and decision&making.

## Mr. Chair,

The same approach to partnerships, including with influencers, is applied to what we do in our climate communications. ?or the launch of the recent Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, or IPCC, +ynthesis Ceport, our social media content was amplified by >= ! oodwill #mbassadors, Messengers of Peace, + ! #dvocates, and other high&profile , - influencers, reaching nearly 8== million followers. +o, basically, we give our content to these >= influencers and reach 8== million people, so it's a really good method of distribution.

To coincide with the release of the +ynthesis Ceport, the +ecretary&! eneral also launched his BinkedIn account, and so far, in lust a few weeks, he has <\*,=== followers already. BinkedIn prominently is promoting his account and featured the +ecretary&! eneral's article on the report in a GTop %oicesH account on the sublect. #t the same time, , - IC Tokyo used trusted weather presenters to amplify its GPromise of 8.\* I H campaign.

The epartment's web and climate teams, meanwhile, have worked e"tensively over recent months on the , - Climate #ction site, adding new segments and features. , - %ideo has reinforced its coverage, producing videos featuring students and activists in their own languages. , - - ews content on climate action continues to account for a significant number of visits to the platform in all languages.

( e are also partnering with digital platforms and harnessing their enormous reach to ensure that audiences are more likely to see accurate information about the climate rather than further mis& and disinformation.

This past +aturday: as we all know, it was \$arth ay: if you went to !oogle on \$arth ay, there would be what's called a !oogle oodle, which is the first thing you see at the top of the home page on a given day. #nd this !oogle oodle pointed users to , - climate content, including links to our #ct - ow campaign of individual actions. If it's anything like it was last year, it will drive

deliver humanitarian assistance on behalf of the , - family and the international community. ( e are working closely with key offices, including PP# and ++, to ensure that we are ma"imi3ing awareness of what the , - is doing right now and also without leopardi3ing anyone's safety.

I would like to now turn to the , kraine war, which has been a focus of our communications since this war began. #s a epartment we meet regularly, in this conte"t of crisis communications, both internally as well as with other , - offices, and we adapt our communications regularly according to the changing circumstances. 6f course, our coverage and media engagement focus on the humanitarian situation as well as the human rights conse/uences. But we also look at efforts to bring about peace and ameliorate the suffering.

6ur , - - ews , kraine focus page provides updates on all angles of

Mis& and disinformation, along with hate speech, have become so ubi/uitous that it is impossible to be a communications professional today and not have to deal with it. ?rom climate change to C6%I &89 vaccines, we have already observed the impacts of a concerted campaign of lies, denials and distortions. But increasingly, however, the , nited - ations is finding that it's not lust our ability to fulfil our mandates that is at stake. it is our staff that are often under direct attack.

This is particularly true in the field, although we do get our share of hate online as , - staff members, including myself, but it's most concerning to our colleagues in the field. 6ur blue helmets, our humanitarian aid workers and our development staff are being deliberately targeted. I think I mentioned this at the informal briefing : in a survey last year of , - peacekeepers, @\*K of them reported that mis& and disinformation were impacting their safety and security.

, - Cesident Coordinators, peace envoys and peacekeeping missions are turning more and more to our epartment and asking for our assistance, both to anticipate and also combat these online attacks. To that end, we are working with other key +ecretariat departments to establish a standing capacity so we can better respond to this problem.

6ur global, - IC network, which is skilled at understanding local audiences and languages, will be a key component of this capacity. (e are going to be working to up&skill our colleagues. Many of them are already e"tensively engaging on this issue.

6ne e"ampleL , - IC Me"ico City launched a video series to promote digital literacy. , - IC 6uagadougou organi3ed an information session with ?asocheck, the leading fact&checking entity in Burkina ?aso, for , - staff operating in that country. , - CIC Brussels created

transatlantic slave trade: it's really, really worth going to our; ouTube channel to watch his statement. 2e is truly ama3ing.

Meanwhile, the epartment has begun preparations to later this year stage the annual International Media +eminar on Peace in the Middle \$ast and the annual Training Programme for Palestinian Broadcasters and 7ournalists, which since last year has been named after +hireen #bu #kleh, the Palestinian&#merican reporter who was killed in the 6ccupied Palestinian Territory last May.

## Mr. Chair,

Multilingualism is the lifeblood of our work. ( ithout it we would not be able to reach and engage audiences. The challenge, of course, as I have said here many times, is to find sufficient resources to make multilingualism a reality. ( here possible we do use technology to serve us, but even in the age of artificial intelligence, it is not always possible to deliver.

+o on this front, though, I am delighted to announce that: thanks to your generosity as Member +tates in providing additional staff resources in this year's budget:, - (eb T% recently launched its website in #rabic, Chinese, ?rench, Cussian, and +panish, complementing the e"isting \$nglish& language version. This means that meetings of the! eneral #ssembly, +ecurity Council and other key, - organs, are now available both live and on&demand in all si" official languages. It's nice to have some good news sometimes.

The epartment also began a new , rdu&language newsletter. #nd, on International Mother Banguage ay in ?ebruary, the ag 2 ammarsklAld Bibrary launched its publication Multilingualism at the United Nations. To support Model , -, the epartment published \$nglish, ?rench and Portuguese versions of The United Nations Guide to Model UN. (e will continue to seek creative ways to e"pand our multilingual footprint.

Meanwhile, I am pleased to announce the launch of a new digital workflow at the Bibrary, which provides comprehensive analysis and metadata creation capability for , - parliamentary and normative documents as well as , - publications. This innovation replaces a system the Bibrary had been using since the late 89E=s and it should make it much easier for researchers, policymakers, and citi3ens alike to tap into the rich online resources of the 6 rgani3ation.

This past year the epartment continued to digiti3e, catalogue and selectively post items in the , - 's historic audiovisual collection. This protect was made possible through a donation by the ! overnment of 6man. +o far, we have digiti3ed \*\*,=== audio, video, and film items, which is about E=K of our initial target. #dditionally, we are preparing a new edition of the popular guide, Basi !a ts a"out the United Nations, which was last published si" years ago.
