Economic and Social Council

Council sessions and meetings

Pursuant to General Assembly resolution 68/1 [YUN 2013, p. 1413], the programme of work of the Economic and Social Council was adjusted to a July-to-July cycle [YUN 2014, p. 1603]. The Council convened its 2015 session from 21 July 2014 to 23 July 2015

intergovernmental bodies on social, economic and related matters, held two regular sessions in 2015: the first in Paris (29–30 April) [CEB/2015/1] and the second in New York (18–19 November) [CEB/2015/2]. Its principal subsidiary bodies met as follows: the High-level Committee on Management held its twenty-ninth (Paris, 19–20 March) [CEB/2015/3] and thirtieth (London, 5–6 October) [CEB/2015/5] sessions; and the High-level Committee on Programmes held its twenty-ninth (Geneva, 11–12 March) [CEB/2015/4] and thirtieth (New York, 12–13 October) [CEB/2015/6] sessions.

In its annual overview report for 2015 [E/2016/56], highlighted its activities in fostering a coherent approach on policy, operations and management to enhance UN system-wide coordination in support of intergovernmental mandates. It also reviewed efforts to enhance coherence and coordination on system-wide preparation and follow-up to UN conferences and summits. CEB continued its efforts to accelerate the implementation of the Millennium Development Goals, support the transition to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development (see p.

Latin American and Caribbean Economic System

As noted by the Secretary-General in his consolidated report (see p. 000), UN system-wide cooperation with the Latin American and Caribbean Economic System continued in the area of trade facilitation.

League of Arab States

As noted by the Secretary-General in his consolidated report (see p. 000), UN system-wide cooperation with the League of Arab States () continued in areas including conflict prevention, mediation, elections, women, peace and security issues, international law, human rights, emergency preparedness and response, humanitarian coordination, refugees and irregular migration, sustainable development, impact of climate change, socioeconomic vulnerability, family health and human trafficking.

By a 15 September note verbale [S/2015/721] to the Security Council President, the Permanent Observer transmitted the resolutions adopted by the 144th Ministerial Meeting of the Council (Cairo, 13–14 September).

Organization for Democracy and Economic Development (GUAM)

As noted by the Secretary-General in his consolidated report (see p. 000), UN system-wide cooperation with the Organization for Democracy and Economic Development— continued in areas such as data exchange and customs.
