the Response

to Returning Foreign Terrorist Fighters

New York, 27 February 2019 – Today, the United Nations Security Council Counter-Terrorism Committee Executive Directorate (CTED) launched its third Trends Report, "<u>The Gender Dimensions of the Response to Returning Foreign Terrorist Fighters</u>." The report - which primarily draws on the work of academia and think tanks, particularly members of CTED's Global Research Network (GRN) - seeks to provide counter-terrorism policy makers, practitioners, and experts with an analysis of the latest research into some of the challenges presented by the gender dimensions of the foreign terrorist fighter (FTF) phenomenon. The report presents the latest research findings on (1) the numbers and demographics of women who travel to, return from, and remain in the conflict zone of Iraq and the Syrian Arab Republic; (2) the drivers of female radicalization; (3) gendered narratives used by terrorists; and (4) implications for counter-measures.
